<b>Kane, David</b>	<p>I am interested in joining the VSSN steering group, and am particularly interested in helping VSSN to develop its website.</p> <p>I have a large amount of experience in using the web to communicate research findings, and in creating and managing websites. I have created a number of websites myself, including <a href="http://voluntarysectorcuts.org.uk/">http://voluntarysectorcuts.org.uk/</a>, <a href="http://data.ncvo-vol.org.uk/">http://data.ncvo-vol.org.uk/</a> and <a href="http://www.skylarknetwork.org.uk/">http://www.skylarknetwork.org.uk/</a>, and am a regular user of web technologies such as PHP, MySQL and WordPress. I also regularly contribute content to the NCVO website, including writing a blog (<a href="http://www.ncvo-vol.org.uk/networking-discussions/blogs/116">http://www.ncvo-vol.org.uk/networking-discussions/blogs/116</a>). I'm particularly interested in how the web changes how researchers present their data and results, and whether the open data agenda has implications for research findings.</p> <p>I have been a member of VSSN for 4 years, since joining the NCVO Research Team, and in that time have attended five "Researching the Voluntary Sector" conferences, and presented papers at two of them. I'm a co-author of NCVO's Almanac series (for which I am responsible for management and analysis of the research data) and also have a keen interest in other voluntary sector research issues, particularly around measurement and classification of voluntary and civil society organisations and the economy of the sector.</p>

<p><b>Kyneswood, Benjamin</b></p>	<p><b>Web Services</b></p> <p><u>Experience</u> I have experience in developing websites for my previous employer. The website, for a community radio station, required interactivity for both the 120 weekly presenters as well as the audience. Presenters were expected to interact with listeners, whilst I provided development and support.</p> <p>I am using blogs as a research method in my PhD research, and created them using Wordpress. I have also developed a social network for my participants at their request.</p> <p>I have also acted as a Charity trustee of Access Space in Sheffield, a charity that promotes the use of free and open source software.</p> <p><u>VSSN Development</u> The VSSN website is an underdeveloped resource. I am happy to commit time and ideas to making it less so.</p>
<p><b>Macmillan, Rob</b></p>	<p>I am seeking election to the VSSN steering group as I would like to contribute time and knowledge with others in continuing to support the growth and development of the network.</p> <p>I have been actively involved in the voluntary sector for over 20 years, formally as a researcher, but also as a volunteer, paid member of staff, committee member and office holder. I have considerable experience of committee work for small community and voluntary organizations, including secretarial work and chairing meetings. I have served a previous period of office on the VSSN steering group where I was responsible for developing marketing and membership plans for the network.</p> <p>Both in my everyday work as a Research Fellow at the Third Sector Research Centre, and through my membership over the last two years of the Editorial Management Board of the Voluntary Sector Review, I have been involved in wider efforts to advance the field of voluntary sector studies. During this period I have acted as vice-chair of the group and taken responsibility for liaison with NCVO in planning and organizing the annual research conference. I have also edited the practice papers section of the Voluntary Sector Review.</p> <p>I have enjoyed being part of the Steering Group and hope to continue to serve for another three years.</p>
